**Subject: Religious Education** 

**Aims of the subject:** Religious Education plays a key role in the academic, personal and spiritual development of our pupils. Through an academic study of Religion, pupils gain an understanding of how different beliefs and values affect our lives on a personal level and also through the influence of religions in shaping contemporary British society. Pupils are introduced to further study of two world religions as living and contemporary faiths, the study of which contributes towards pupils learning to respect and critically engage with beliefs and practices. Pupils from all faiths, and none, are able to enjoy engaging with inspiring RE whilst developing transferrable skills that will help to prepare pupils for life-long learning.

## How you can support your child's progress

- Pupils will regularly be set homework which requires them to learn key words, definitions, key quotes and to learn religious teachings about the topics studied. Supporting your child by regularly testing them and/or encouraging them to make cue cards for the information they need to learn so they can test themselves would be beneficial.
- In the front of every pupil's exercise book is an RE marking sheet (on yellow paper). This allows pupils and parents/carers to check the effort and behaviour grade and the specific targets that each pupil has been given to help them progress each half term.
- When pupils are revising for assessments they benefit from being tested at home on their ability to explain the topic they are revising.
- Helping your child to proof read their work to check their spelling, punctuation and grammar and to ensure that they have made good use of connectives to extend their writing, will help to improve the quality of written communication.
- In everyday conversation, encourage your child to use full clear sentences and Standard English. Maybe even reward them for trying to use more advanced vocabulary. Good oral literacy leads to better written literacy too.
- Encourage your child in wider reading, there is a display in the R.E. department detailing recommended fiction which will help pupils to consider some of the topics we are studying from a range of view points. All books are available through the JCL.
