ATTENDANCE

If your child is unwell and unable to attend school you must phone school on the first day of their absence before 8.45am to provide a reason for their absence. ORGANISATION

For the first time in their school life your son/daughter will be responsible for organising everything that they need. Good organisation is essential and is the key to being successful.

Please ensure that they:

- Keep a copy of their timetable at home in a prominent place.
- Keep all their school books/equipment together in one safe place.
- Pack their bag the night before with all of the books and equipment that they need for the next day and that you check if for them.

Everyday essential equipment

Your child **must** bring the following equipment to **every** lesson:

- Journal (provided by school)
- Black or blue pen
- Green pen
- Pencil, ruler, rubber
- Whiteboard and whiteboard pen
- Calculator Casio Classwiz fx-85GT X
- Exercise books and textbooks required for their lessons each day
- Reading book

SUBJECT-SPECIFIC ESSENTIAL EQUIPMENT

- PE kit
- A pair of compasses and a protractor (for Maths lessons)
- Black fine line pen (Technology)

Arriving at lessons without the equipment listed above will result in lost learning time and will be sanctioned with 'clicks'.

OTHER USEFUL EQUIPMENT

- Glue stick
- Highlighter

HOMEWORK

All of your son/daughter's homework will be set on our virtual learning platform – Firefly, which you will be able to access. Login details will be sent home in the first week of the autumn term. Your son/daughter will also record any homework in their journal. Please check it every evening as this will enable you to support them and to help them manage their time effectively.

Whilst I appreciate that they need a little down time after a busy day at school it is still advantageous if homework is completed on the day it is issued. Please provide a quiet, calm environment in which to complete their work. Take away any distractions such as mobile phones, tablets and televisions.

Encourage your son/daughter to do their best, take an active interest in their work and talk to them about it. If they are unable to complete a piece of work they should go back and speak to their subject teacher.

SUPPORT FOR HOMEWORK

As a school we seek to take away any barriers to learning. As such, we provide many different opportunities to enable all our pupils to complete homework within school at the following times:

Breakfast Club	The Bridge	Monday – Friday, 8.00am – 8.45am
Lunchtime Club	The Bridge	Monday – Friday, 12.25pm – 1pm
Homework Club	CS1	Wednesday – Friday, 3.05pm – 4pm

The Bridge Manager supervises all of the above sessions. Within school there are facilities to print out work.

Contacting School

If you need to pass a message onto your son/daughter please do not contact them on their mobile phone. Mobile phones must be switched off and kept out of sight in bags from 8.45am–3.05pm. Rather, phone the school office on 01524 64496 and a message will be passed on.

SUPPORTING YOUR CHILD

LITERACY

A good level of literacy is crucial for your child's success in all areas of the curriculum and as your child learns more about the different subject areas across the curriculum it is important that they can express themselves clearly through what they write and what they say. Also, competent readers will find it easier to acquire and comprehend new knowledge. There are plenty of things that you, as parents, can do to help:

Reading

Reading should be an enjoyable activity, but some children need a bit of encouragement in discovering the magic of literature. Try buying your child books as presents and take the time to browse the local book shop or library. Talk to your child about what they like and what they think about the book. Never force a child to read a book they don't like; reading should be a joy, not a chore. Maybe try a shared 20 minute family read slot a few times a week, whereby everyone commits to sitting together and reading for a period of time. Family members can read different things and chat about what they've read too.


Writing

In Year 7, children will be expected to develop a good writing stamina, meaning they can write a lot. We want to encourage pupils to recognise that great writing doesn't just happen, but that great writing is planned, carefully crafted and refined through redrafting and editing. Pupils will be shown how to edit their work using a green pen and you can help them to do this at home when they have finished homework activities across all subjects in the curriculum. You can help them check for accuracy errors and support them in the refining process.

Ideas for Summer

During the summer holidays, you can help by encouraging your child to read. The local library will be running a summer reading challenge and anyone who completes the challenge and takes their certificate to their new English teacher will receive a small prize. If you are going on holiday or on a day trip, ask your child to read some tourist information material and then give you a summary of what you might expect of your trip or holiday. In addition, the English department at Ripley will be providing your child with a Summer Project on the novel, The One and Only Ivan. Your child will receive a copy of this book which they are to read and complete various and exciting tasks on, ready for the start of their academic journey at Ripley in September. To continue ensuring pupils are engaging with literacy over the summer break, a Cubio activity will be available on the school website where they are asked to complete a line of literacy based activities of their choosing.

Every year we are blown away by the extraordinary effort and quality of work completed by pupils. We look forward to seeing what your child comes up with this year!


MATHEMATICS

In addition to the basic equipment, for Maths lessons pupils will be expected to have:

- a protractor
- a scientific calculator (Model: CASIO Classwiz fx-85GT X)
- a pair of compasses

Building mathematical ideas

Success in mathematics relies on mastering core skills and being fluent in the basics. This enables deeper mathematical thinking and understanding to develop more easily as pupils progress through the school. Pupils should already be able to:



Maths skills for life

Our aim is to develop the full potential of every pupil in Mathematics, whatever their starting point. We want pupils to have a positive attitude to Mathematics and aspire to experience success and enjoyment in the subject. The Mathematics department uses a wide variety of both classroom-based and on-line activities and resources to motivate, engage and challenge pupils of all abilities.

Teaching focuses on enabling pupils to reason mathematically and develop problem solving skills, over time and in different contexts, to enable pupils to get the most out of day-to-day life experiences as they encounter them. Pupils are also encouraged and stretched to develop more robust skills and knowledge, should they wish to pursue Mathematics beyond GCSE.
