COVID update

I am pleased to report that COVID cases have dropped significantly during the past two weeks and we are now well below the threshold for extra contingency measures in school. This means that, from Monday, there will no longer be the expectation to wear face coverings in communal areas and we will be returning to assemblies and worships in person.

Standards

Pupils who are found to be rolling their skirt up will be issued with an Academy detention. If your child's school skirt is currently too short, please ensure they are equipped with a new one for their return after the October half term holiday.

Sixth Form Dress Code

The dress code for our Sixth Form students is 'Professional Dress'. Whilst many students are dressed appropriately and look very smart, there are some students who are not arriving dressed for a smart, working environment.
