Re: the Archbishop of York award in year 7

As you may be aware, your child has been working since November 2022 in their RE lessons to complete various aspects of the fantastic Archbishop of York award. This award recognises year 7 pupils who have tried to develop their Christian-based leadership skills while helping their local communities. Thus far, your child has studied what it means to be a servant leader through the examples of some great Christian leaders such as Dr. Martin Luther King Jnr. and Bethany Hamilton. They have also raised awareness of 2 local charities, the Olive branch food bank and Galloways which helps visually impaired people. Additionally, every year 7 pupil created an Easter card which was bundled up and sent to 9 different residential homes across the Lancaster and Morecambe area. Finally, during the summer term, your child's form tutor will help them carry out a litter pick across the school grounds as their 4th volunteering act.

With all of this in mind, your child's RE homework is to plan, carry out and review their 5th and final Archbishop of York volunteering task. To do this, they will need to have completed both sides of their "Planning my community volunteering project" sheet (example below – spare copies have been attached to the home learning task set for your child on Firefly) BEFORE they carry out their volunteering project. They will also need to have spoken to you about what they intend to do to make sure that their chosen project is suitable for someone of their age to do.

I am also more aware of how vulnerable this group of people might feel and how I can help them in small ways.	
April 2023	#2 (P) - I raised awareness of Galloways, our local charity for the blind and visually impaired.	I took part in a blind awareness walk during PSHE day and then reflected in writing on how this was as an experience. I then carried out some research into Galloways and raised awareness of what they did by telling someone in my family about them.	I am now more aware of what it feels like to be visually impaired and what it feels like to lead someone who cannot see. I am also more aware of how vulnerable this group of people might feel and how I can help them in small ways.	
March 2023	#3 (P/C) - I sent an Easter card and little letter to an elderly person in a residential home.	I designed and completed an Easter card as well as writing a letter telling the resident who I am and why I am sending them an Easter card.	The residents of 7 different homes have now received one Easter card each from year 7 pupils. Lots of the residential homes have sent back emails to say thank you for the cards on behalf of their very happy residents. I am also more aware of how vulnerable this group of people might feel and how I can help them in small ways.	
April- June 2023	#4 (s) - I took part in a litter pick around school.	Wearing a hi-vis jacket, I used a litter- picker to collect litter from around the school. We completed this activity as a class during one of our RE lessons.	The school grounds looked much tidier once our class had completed our task. The site staff were also able to comment upon the positive impact of the litter pick. I am also now more aware of how dropping one piece of litter can lead to others dropping litter and what I can do to stop this in future.	

Page 2 of the "AoY award projects record" sheet (example at foot of page 2 of this letter – spare copies have been attached to the home learning task set for your child on Firefly) must also be completed and returned with their planning sheet to their RE teacher AT THE START OF THEIR FIRST RE LESSON BACK AFTER THE HALF TERM BREAK (i.e. during the week beginning Monday 5th June).

This final volunteering project, alongside their planning sheet, evidence sheet and their 3 completed Archbishop of York award booklets will provide the RE department with the evidence we need to decide upon the appropriate level of award that your child's efforts throughout the year deserve. A certificate, badge and pen will be presented to your child before the end of the summer term.
